The Auburn Goddard School, a preschool, held a lemonade stand Friday, Aug. 8, to raise money for the Jimmy Fund.

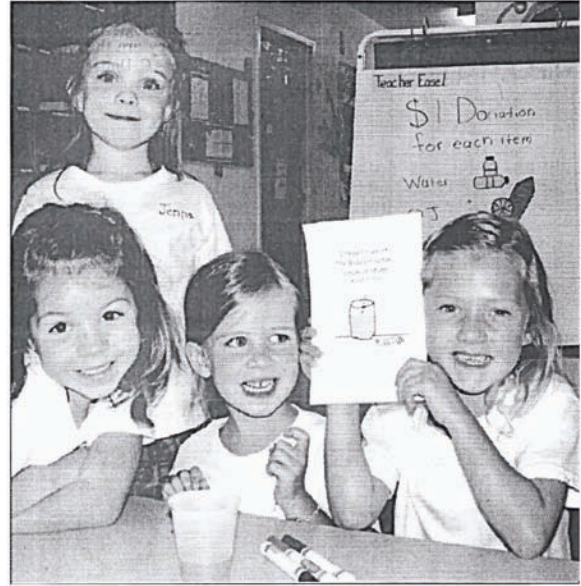
